Many children this week will have had the opportunity to plant a young hedgerow plant within our new Forest Garden area. Once again, watching the children get so excited about engaging with nature, in their own community, is something very satisfying. It will be their actions and attitudes towards nature and the environment that will shape our world in the future. I hope their experience at Denmead Junior School will help shape them in a wholly responsible, healthy and beneficial way both for themselves and the world around them.

As we move carefully toward returning to a more 'normal' future, we have taken the opportunity to begin reorganising our classrooms back to a more familiar primary school set-up. The children, for the time being, will remain in fixed positions but now will be better able to engage collegiately with each other on their tables, rather than in rows. It feels the right move to be making at this time and is supported by the current guidance, but we will reserve the right to











change back, should the local and national picture change. I am ever hopeful but always vigilant, that children's educational experience can now be better prioritised.

Looking forward, as we are, I also would like to tell you broadly how we will be organising classes and school in general from next year. As I shared before the Easter break, we are moving back into discrete year groups. Our intention, for the current year 3/4 classes is to keep them within their current class groups as we separate them into their discreet year groups. For example, the year 4 cohort from one class will join with the year 4 cohort from another class to make one, new year 5 class. This will help maintain the current friendship groups, give the children a sense of change but without it being too overwhelming.

We have asked the infant school to suggest the new year 3 classes as they know their children best. Meanwhile our current year 5 will remain in their current groups as they transition up in to year 6 classes.

We are currently considering the new start and finish times for next academic year, working with the infant school to ensure that these work well for the Denmead schools community as a whole. Any decision will work well for both schools and with that in mind, we are likely to move back to one start and finish time, sufficiently timed so that siblings can be easily collected from both sites.

We will shortly be able to share with you our list of extra-curricular clubs that we can offer for the rest of this term. As soon as we are able to confirm this, we will.

Please continue with your efforts to instil a sense of positivity around reading, whilst ensuring that your child reads regularly. I shared with the children in my latest PRIDE assembly, a quote about respect. It reads, "Show respect to people even if they don't deserve it. Respect is a reflection of your character, not theirs."

Too often, our own behaviour can be negatively influenced by the behaviour of others. We encourage our children to take responsibility for their own behaviour and not to blame their behaviour on the behaviour of others. It's difficult, and none of us are perfect but we should all try and maintain our own high standards, even when, in the moment, we might forget ourselves because of how others or the situation may have impacted on us... the school car park, for example!
